Our first meeting was held on April 23, 2016. The focus of that meeting was to define "Discipleship" and how we, as a committee, could follow Matthew's command to "go and make disciples" within our own congregation.

2016 Annual Report for the Big Wood School

2016 has been such an amazing year for Big Wood School. We have grown and improved in ways beyond our wildest dreams and it has been such a blessing to be a part of it all.

We have now expanded to eight classes with a total of over 110 students. We have increased our staff to keep in line with our desired ratios with the most fabulous teachers and aides that enrich the lives of our students and their families every day. Several of our aides recently enrolled in Early Childhood Education college classes in hopes of becoming teachers down the road. In addition, we have all participated in some amazing continuing education opportunities over the past year that have taught us new techniques, strategies, and tools to incorporate into our teaching. We consistently strive to be as knowledgeable and informed as possible so we can be our very best.

This year we have added several extracurriculars into our already dynamic curriculum. Creative Movement, Yoga, and Music lessons are now built into our weekly schedule with specialty teachers coming in to share their knowledge and talents in those areas with us. We have continued our Hailey bus service in the mornings, as well as in the afternoons, and are running a Spuds bus that picks up all of our little skiers at Dollar Mountain after their ski clinic during the Winter months. Our families are so grateful that we offer these extra transportation services as it relieves a lot of their daily stress.

In December, we were privileged enough to create a Creative Art "Let's Get Messy" Room in what was formerly the Church's Library. We are so thankful for the access to this space. It has already put to such good use as we prepare for our Annual Gallery Walk Ribbon Cutting on February 21st. We plan to use this area to allow our students to explore and create with a variety of mediums and materials and develop a love for the arts.

We continue to teach God's Word and plant seeds of faith in the hearts of our students. We have combined several online Christian curriculums to build one of our own that we teach in Sanctuary every morning. It is structured around the Jesus Storybook Bible, which we present to every Big Wood graduate as they leave Big Wood School. The number of school families that attend PCBW has continued to grow and it is our pleasure to work in unison with the Children's Ministry Team to be sure to invite and include all families in all special events and classes offered.

We anticipate enrollment to remain steady in 2017 and can't wait to see what God has in store for us!

2016 Annual Report for Building & Grounds

One of the greatest challenges of 2016 was managing the impact on our roof caused by the unusually heavy snow load. The formation of ice dams on the roof created leaks that damaged portions of the building's interior. Shoveling snow off the roof to reach the ice dams punctured the membrane on the flat portions of the roof, creating additional leaks. Fortunately (thank God) most of the cost of repairing the facility was covered by insurance. After taking care of the immediate problems a comprehensive study was performed, leaning on the expertise of local roofers and insulation contractors, to establish a plan for restructuring the roof to eliminate the formation of ice dams. Unfortunately, it is an extensive program that will take time to develop funds for and execute. In the meantime, additional heat tape has been added to the roof to help control/eliminate the formation of ice dams (a band aid solution).

Another fairly large unexpected expenditure was for a replacement fan and motor for the heating system in the sanctuary and Outer Court Gallery. It took two weeks to order, receive and install the replacement parts. The congregation was full of grace as they shivered during the Sunday morning service.

During the year laying new carpet in the school facility and adding turf to the playground was completed. Many thanks to Kim Piggins for bird-dogging these projects.

Toward the end of the year all of the defective light bulbs and tubes were replaced and five surface mounted ceiling fixtures were installed in the church and school. This turned out to be a larger project than first surmised. A local contractor did the work and he did it well.

Our large facility is truly a gift from God. We are grateful to the huge number of people who interface with and use the facility each week. They obviously work to take care of and respect this wonderful gift.

Children's Ministry Annual Report to Session

How do we determine that our children's ministry activities are effectively drawing people toward Christ and growing them in their faith? Sometimes it's by looking at the numbers like attendance. It could be a personal story of growth, a baptism or even a comment made by a child when they make a connection to a Bible lesson. Many times, we don't get to see some of the real fruits of our labor in working with children because the seeds that are planted bloom and grow AFTER leaving this ministry. Here are some of the ways we saw success in 2016:

PCBW children's ministry experienced:

- growth in attendance in our five year old and under age groups
- several new and first time volunteers in children's ministry
- several new children's ministry team members

Much of this new growth has come from intentional outreach and relationship development with Big Wood School families and staff.

- We offered two Love and Logic Parent Training Classes with over thirty parents in attendance at each session, most of whom are Big Wood School parents.
- We also hosted our first Ice Skating event in Hailey's new rink which was received with much enthusiasm and great attendance by school families.

Other Events and Services to highlight:

- Our two all-church family events, the Progressive Bike Dinner and Redfish Day at the Lake, were both very well attended by folks from all generations creating time to foster relationships and recreate together.
- Packed-house attendance on Easter Sunday and at the Family Christmas Eve service
- 2016's Surf Shack Vacation Bible School had the highest attendance yet, with over 125 children from all over the Wood River Valley plus several visitors from out of town.
- WOW 4th-6th grade ministry met every Sunday with a consistent number of kids each week.

Outreach:

- Local Our Vacation Bible School outreach project provided free, hand packaged laundry detergent and softener sheets for patrons at two local laundromats.
- International Thanks to longtime children's ministry volunteer Greg Eslinger, our outreach project, Operation Christmas Child, served as an area drop off location in 2016, and collected more boxes than ever for children in need - over 600 shoeboxes!

It is through the PCBW family's continued support through tithing and volunteering that we are able to offer our programs. We plan to build on this solid foundation in 2017 using creative methods to spread the timeless message of the Good News!

Our church had a strong financial year in 2016. We are grateful for the very generous giving this past year that allowed our church to serve our community.

2016 Donation Income

Total operating donation income was \$737,351 which was \$62,351 more than the budgeted income of \$675,000.

2016 Expenses

Expenses for 2016 were \$727,034 which was \$52,034 more than budgeted. This amount over budget is due primarily to legal and staff recruitment expenses that were not anticipated.

2016 Annual Report for Church Missions

The Overseers of the Missions at PCBW are tasked with the privilege of "Touching the World for Christ". We accomplish this with our support of local, national, and international missionaries. This past year, we were blessed by the generosity of the congregation and given a budget of \$67,500. This is based on prior giving levels and 10% of the total PCBW budget. As a committee, we require all missionaries to submit a "Request for Support Form". This form details their ministry and how they would utilize the support if granted. We, as a committee, also determined to create a "reserve" fund. This was to be available to support any missionaries that felt God calling them after our budgets were set and to have available in the event of a shortfall. Last year, with the generosity of the congregation, we were able to support the following missions:

Locally

- 1. Youth Mission Trips (\$10,000) This money was used for the Youth Retreat and miscellaneous youth outreaches.
- 2. **SONDance Retreat Center (\$500)** This donation was used for helping maintain their center that helps ministers and missionaries heal, restore, and reignite their passion for the calling the Lord has placed on their hearts.
- 3. Global Community Partners in Boise: (\$4,800) Nick and Laura Armstrong work to build a bridge between the Church and the Nations at our doorstep.
- 4. Snowboarders/Skiers for Christ: (\$17,500) This money was used to set-up a chapter of this ministry in Sun Valley. Phil and Adrian Bouiss have spearheaded this outreach to our community.
- 5. **The Agape Fund: (\$6,000)** JoAnn Boswell and Bob Nero head up this ministry and it goes to help people who are in need of immediate financial aid...(ie: housing, utilities, food, an medicines).
- 6. The Hunger Coalition (\$1,700) The money is used to help feed the hungry in Wood River Valley.

Nationally

- 1. Campus Crusade for Christ: (\$4,800) Rob and Kristen Hamm are working at the University of Oregon through Bible Studies and outreaches. The donation helps to cover costs for evangelism materials, discipleship materials and salary, and health benefits etc.
- 2. **The College Connection: (\$159.28)** Erika Greenberg used these funds to purchase note cards and stamps to send encouragement words and Scriptures to our college students that have left our Valley.

Internationally

- 1. Northrise University: (\$7,500) Located in Zambia, the money was used to sponsor four students for one year at this Christ Centered University.
- 2. Mapalo Orphanage (\$7,500) The money went for the general fund of the Orphanage and Academy to help with meals, teachers, and providing basic healthcare for approximately 350 students.

- 3. <u>Missionary Gospel Fellowship: (\$1,000.00)</u> Located in Tijuana. Dave and Debbie Tazelaar use the money to fund their Christmas Ministry which gives food baskets which include Scriptures as well as breakfast totes.
- 4. <u>Free WheelChair Missions: (\$500.00)</u> Donations were used for manufacturing and shipping wheelchairs to those in need in over 91 developing countries.

This Year upon receiving "Request for Support" forms and thoughtful prayer, our committee has allocated the projected funds of \$65,000 to the following missionaries:

Locally

- 1. Youth Missions: (\$7,500) for international mission trip for the youth.
- 2. **SONDance Retreat Center: (\$1,000)** for continual missionary refreshment support.
- 3. **Global Community Partners: (\$4,800)** continual bridging of Christ with international immigrants.
- 4. **<u>Big Wood Pre-School: (\$5,000)</u>** to assist with tuition scholarships to those in need.
- 5. **<u>Ketchum Community Dinners: (\$1,000)</u>** supplies and food to serve dinners on Wednesday nights.
- 6. **Hunger Coalition: (\$2,000)** to help feed those in need in the Wood River Valley.
- 7. Agape Fund: (\$6,000) to provide financial assistance to those in immediate need.

Nationally

1. <u>Campus Crusade for Christ in Oregon: (\$6,000)</u>: Continued evangelism on the University of Oregon's campus.

Internationally

- 1. Northrise University: (\$8,500) Continual support for this Christian University in Zambia.
- 2. <u>Mapalo Orphanage: (\$8,500)</u> Continued support for health care, meals, education, and other provisions for children at the Orphanage.
- 3. <u>Missionary Gospel Fellowship in Tijuana: (\$2,000)</u> Donation for food and evangelism supplies in poverty areas in Tijuana.
- 4. **Free Wheelchair Missions: (\$500)**: \$79 gets one manufactured and delivered wheelchair to over 91 developing countries.

Reserve Account is set at \$7,500 and this year we are setting aside \$4,700 to create a Music Outreach to our Valley.

One of the major events in the life of the Personnel Committee was that Cheri Watson, PCBW Deacon, agreed to chair the committee. During the year, a substantial amount of effort was devoted to developing/reworking job descriptions for every staff position in the church and school. In addition, standard employment contracts were written for all positions with the help of local counsel.

2016 Annual Report for Student Ministries

The youth ministry continues to see growth both spiritually and numerically. We minister to over a hundred students throughout the valley in various ways. In the last year we have seen God do many amazing things through our ministry; below are a few things I would like to highlight:

Over thirty students began a relationship with Jesus! Ten of them made the decision to be baptized.

Many students have experienced freedom in Christ. We have seen students healed from mental and emotional issues, addiction, and physically.

Our core groups of students have been empowered to grow deeper in their faith and learn how to function in their gifts and talents. Several students have been able to share their faith publicly as well as preach at Fuel and on Youth Sunday's. Our youth worship band has grown in their heart for worship and their musical skills, they have played many times for the congregation during our transition to a new director. Other students have been able to boldly pray for and minister to their peers and others in the community.

At the beginning of last year our team prayed for a greater influence with the Hispanic population in the valley. We have seen a huge response to our prayer and currently 40% of our students are from this community. Many of these students have become believers in the past year and have been successful reaching out to their peers and families with the Gospel.

The student ministry continues to grow in community. Many of our students consider Fuel to be like a family. We constantly see students forming new friendships outside of their normal social circles with Jesus as the unifying factor. For some students, the relationships at Fuel are the only positive ones in their lives and these students find hope and love by being involved in our community.

Our adult leadership continues to see growth. We have added several new leaders in the past year. Also, the leaders continue to grow in their heart for ministry and in their gifts and talents. Our leaders preach on a regular basis, lead worship and spend time connecting with students outside of church.

2016 Annual Report for the Worship Committee

We began the year with Mark Mueller as the interim worship leader. He and his wife moved away to help start a new church and we then moved to having volunteer worship leaders coordinated by Adrianna Bouiss. There was a Worship Leader Search Committee that screened applications and conducted Skype interviews. In late November and early December, we had two applicants come to Ketchum and interview and lead Sunday morning contemporary worship. The committee asked Trent Austin to come to PCBW as our Director of Worship and he accepted. He will move here in February and begin leading worship in March 2017.

We continue to have two worship services during most of the year. The first service is more contemporary in that the music is contemporary praise songs and the service is less formal. There is a children's moment during this service and concurrent Sunday school during the first hour.

The second service is more traditional including hymns and responsive readings of scripture.

There was much discussion and prayer by the Worship Leader Search Committee over our worship services and the direction that we would like to see them move. We feel as though our new worship director, Trent Austin, is an answer to prayer. He is much more than a song leader for the services. He has been a director of worship at a large church and mentors other worship leaders. We are expecting that Trent will lead our church toward a time of close personal communion with God during our Sunday services and contribute to the spiritual growth of our members both in church and in our personal lives.

Our Sunday services average about 150 to 180 congregants for the first service and 40 to 60 people at the second service. PCBW has 180 members, 120 active attenders, and 100 affiliate members. There were 12 baptisms in 2016.

During the Sun Valley Jazz Festival in October, the Midiri Brothers jazz band played traditional hymns in a jazz rendition. This has become an annual event at PCBW.

Members of the worship committee cut the Christmas trees in December and set them up in the sanctuary. The following day the whole church participated in the Hanging of the Greens tradition when we decorated the sanctuary, the River Room and the Outer Court Gallery for Christmas. We then partook of a chili feed pot luck lunch as a congregation.

Patty Parsons-Tewson has been the interim choir director and has just accepted the position of adult choir director. Her community Hallelujah Chorus made up of about 1/3 PCBW choir members that sang a Christmas concert and also a Christmas version of Handel's Messiah in the Christmas season.
